Dear Friends

On Wednesday, we held the funeral of Carole Youles in St Helen's church. Despite the sadness, it was a lovely occasion full of love and warmth for a very special woman who had sung in the choir for many years. Some of our church family were able to stand outside church in honour of Carole. That meant such a lot to Keith: thank you.

Carole's service marked an important 'first' for us in our gradual, careful, emergence from lock-down. About ten days ago, the Church of England said that choirs and worship groups could begin singing in worship again, either outside or inside, although congregational singing is not allowed. Even the singing of choirs and worship groups has to be carefully risk assessed: singers have to stand 2m apart from each other, and at least 2m away from the congregation; only 'small groups' should sing at any one time: the singers should not face one another as they sing - and so on.

Nonetheless, what an important and exciting development this is for all of our congregations! It meant that we could have four singers singing together at Carole's funeral. It was almost overwhelming hearing sung worship in a church building again; so beautiful; a measure of some of what we have missed.

I have had a meeting with Andrew Chapman and Caroline Essex to look at a Risk Assessment for reintroducing the St Helen's choir to in-building services. There is already a plan for music at Staunton Harold, and I look forward to conversations at Breedon and at Isley Walton and, in time, at Coleorton, when the congregation there feels ready to meet in-person again. Our musical worship in each of these settings will be different to what we have been used to, but how good it will be to 'sing to the Lord a new song!'

Music is an integral part of Advent and Christmas as celebrated in each of our parishes, and I am already turning my mind to how we might celebrate these important seasons this year, when much of what we usually do just won't be possible. Watch this space....

Finally, after a period when we have been 'fire-fighting' - responding to each new development as best we could, writing and re-writing risk assessments - I hope we are emerging into a steadier state when we can begin to do some more sustained thinking, some more generative work, take a future-look. I've set out some of these opportunities in this week's pew sheet. What could you engage with?

The Church of England is asking all its parishes to ready themselves for conversations about human sexuality. To help us in this, they are producing resources called *Living in Love and Faith* which will be available to us next year.

In the meantime, they are asking us to engage in a series of conversations called 'Pastoral Principles'.

These 'Pastoral Principles' are designed to help us have good conversations even on challenging topics; conversations where we are open and attentive to others, and alert to our own assumptions, preferences, even prejudices. They are designed, too, to help us look at our life together and identify any hidden barriers which might make some feel unwelcome among us.

In September and October, our Flagstaff Family will explore these 'Pastoral Principles' together on Zoom.
