Notices for 18th October, 2020

When we lived in Melton Mowbray we were very close to the Leicester - Peterborough railway, a busy line. For some time while we were in the area there was a foot-crossing over the tracks. It had one of those signs that said 'Stop, Look, and Listen'. One day we witnessed someone crossing whilst wearing earphones, we could hear the oncoming train sounding its warning horn with an increasingly frantic regularity!! The person was completely oblivious and was close to being struck, but wasn't.

As churches we are working our way through the postponed Annual Parochial Church Meetings (APCM) and it does strike me that now even more than ever we may need to be mindful of the advice on that signpost. Stop, Look and Listen.

Sometimes it can be good to Stop, giving ourselves a chance to think about what we are going say and how it will be said. Perhaps trying to be mindful of how it will be understood. The busyness and frustration of our current lives can be so distracting, stopping can therefore be a good thing, pausing can provide a chance to take a step away from ourselves.

Looking is important – 'noticing' was a theme for a Prayer For the Day this week. So by properly looking we notice things, not just the things that are obvious but those little hidden things. Of course we can't see what isn't there but absence is something to also be aware of. Therefore taking a good look can be helpful, it brings opportunities to see a lot of what is and isn't going on around us.

This brings us to Listen. The first word of the Rule of St Benedict is listen. Listening can be a discipline, we need to listen to God, to others and even to ourselves. Even in Covid times there are different needs being expressed. We all come with our own preferences but we should also be aware of preferences of others, we need to listen.

If we were to be using a railway crossing footpath, listening often means taking note of what is not there, namely a train!! The science tells us the crossing is clear. Sometimes the absence of voices is worth paying attention to also.

Stop look and listen, is also a good place to start in prayer for very similar reasons, stopping, taking time out for God. Looking, looking around perhaps giving thanks and taking notice of needs etc that surround us. Then of course there's listen, listen to God - after all prayer is not a monologue.

An additional role for Mary: The Diocese of Leicester's Rural Mission Enabler

It will be announced next week that I have been appointed as the Diocese of Leicester's Rural Mission Enabler, a role which I will fulfil alongside my existing vocation as Team Rector of the Flagstaff Family of Churches. The Rural Mission Enabler is a new role which has been developed in response to both the Bishop of Leicester's Rural Commission (2017) and the Covid-19 pandemic which has exacerbated the challenges faced by many rural churches. The purpose of the role is to develop and implement a bold new strategy for rural mission and ministry, which will feed into the diocese's wider 2026 planning. This is a significant, strategic piece of work which has been weighted at two days a week.

I know that many of you will be concerned how I will manage this project on top of my work here, but I want to assure you I agreed to take on this role, at the invitation of Bishop Martyn, only after I had negotiated significant resources to enable me to do so. I will, then, have a one-day a week researcher, who will research aspects of the project and deal with its administration; a one day a week PA who will deal with some of my Flagstaff Family administration and, whilst Stewart is on placement, an assistant priest who will support me in priestly ministry and in leadership of some aspects of the Flagstaff Family. I hope this goes some way to reassuring you that this new role will be sustainable for me, without effecting adversely our life together. Please pray for me as I take up the reins of this new role. And do ask me about it when you're speaking to me -I would love to answer your questions. **Revd Mary**

There will be a said service of Holy Communion that afternoon at 4pm in St Helen's, streamed live to Facebook.
