Notices for 11th July 2021

Dear Friends

Well, the long awaited announcement has finally been made. July 19th, it seems, will almost certainly be 'Freedom Day', when most, if not all Covid-19 restrictions in England and Wales are lifted and something approaching 'normality' returns.

I wonder how you're feeling.

Some of you might feel real relief, even joy, that you are able to pick up some of those things that you have had to set down for so long. As your sisters and brothers, we rejoice with you. ('Rejoice with those who rejoice', Paul writes.)

Some of you might be feeling very anxious, even angry. Perhaps you are clinically extremely vulnerable and freedom for some means a return to isolation for you. Or perhaps, because of other circumstances unrelated to Covid, 19th July won't bring a change to your circumstances and all this talk of freedom only emphasises your isolation. As your brothers and sisters, we weep with you. ('Weep with those who weep', Paul writes.)

And some of you might be feeling perplexed: the infection rate is rising - is now really the time? As your sisters and brothers, we wonder with you.

In March 2020, in the final in-building

sermons I preached, I suggested to you our three-fold 'Coronavirus Charter'; that we would 'be honest about how we feel, frame our feelings with faith and protect the most vulnerable.'

In approaching 'Freedom Day' (or 'Isolation Day') we need to hold those same values before us.

As restrictions ease, what will 'protecting the most vulnerable' mean as we gather in our buildings for worship? -

- certainly it must mean a continuation of some livestreaming of services - just because some of us can come back, it doesn't mean we all can:
- perhaps it might mean keeping some bookable parts of our buildings where people can continue sit at a 2m distance from others, and to wear masks if that makes them feel safer;
- perhaps it might mean that we work to maximise the ventilation around our buildings once again;
- perhaps it might mean that we all decide to wear masks as we move about church, so that the most vulnerable

feel safe, only removing them when we are in our seats:

- perhaps it might mean 'waiter service' for some at coffee after worship, so that those who feel vulnerable don't have to queue with others to collect their drinks:
- perhaps it might mean that 'jaunty waving' is how we share the Peace for a bit longer.

And so, you see, 'normal' might be, for us, not 'old normal' but 'new normal' as we seek to move together into the future carrying the most vulnerable beside us and within us, at our heart.

Our PCCs will ponder our new normal over the coming few days, considering guidance from the Church of England, when it becomes available - not least on whether and how everyone will be able to receive the wine at Holy Communion - and carrying out fresh risk assessments. We'll keep you posted.

In the meantime, like many of you I really am looking forward to the day when I can sing in church, when I can make physical contact with my Flagstaff Family members again. But I don't want my song to repel others, and when I embrace, I want no-one held outside the circle of love. My friends, we need God's wisdom and God's grace now, as much as ever before. Let us love one another.

◆ Zoom Lecture – 'History, heritage and faith: Richard III the gift that keeps on giving' 21st July, 7.30pm by the Very Revd David Monteith The Very Revd Dr David Monteith is Dean of Leicester. He led the project and oversaw the reinternment of King Richard III in Leicester Cathedral in 2015. David has been Dean since 2013, previously having served as Canon Chancellor with responsibility for learning and public theology. Prior to serving in Leicester he was Team Rector and Area Dean in Wimbledon and Associate Vicar of St Martin in the Fields London. There he led the English speaking congregations, was chaplain to the Homeless, and helped to develop the £37million to renew and redevelop St Martins. He now chairs the College of Deans for the Church of England. He grew up in Northern Ireland during the Troubles followed by studies in Durham and Nottingham.
